Project Organisation

The Metropolitan Migrant Resource Centre (MMRC) is a community based organisation that provides a range of services to culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) communities.

Project Summary

Sharing Stories is an innovative project that uses theatre and drama-based strategies to empower members of CALD communities to become peer educators. These educators break through cultural barriers to appropriately communicate sexual health & blood borne virus education as well as offer support, appropriate resources & referral pathways to increase access to sexual health. The project is built on the following health promotion frameworks, strategies & documents: Ottawa Charter, Jakarta Declaration, HIV and Mobility in Australia: Road Map for Action & Community development framework

Populations Involved: Multicultural youth

Duration: 2008—2016

Funding: Department of Health WA as well as small project grants from Hepatitis WA and the Office of Multicultural Interest WA

Project Aim

To reduce the transmission of sexually transmissible infections (STIs) and blood-borne viruses (BBVs) in CALD communities living in Western Australia through evidence-based and innovative strategies, health promotion frameworks and community mobilisation.

Project Objectives

- Increase STI and BBV health literacy, uptake of harm minimisation strategies, screening, treatment and use of relevant care and support services by CALD community members.
- Increase responsiveness and service coordination in relation to STI and BBV transmission in CALD communities.
- Strengthen relevant partnerships with CALD services and health sector stakeholders.

Road Map Action Areas

The <u>HIV and Mobility in Australia: Road</u>
<u>Map for Action</u> proposes 71 strategies
under five action areas to address HIV in
mobile populations. This project addresses
the following action areas.

Action Area 3) Community mobilisation

Strategy 3.2. Develop HIV knowledge and capacity amongst migrant community, cultural and spiritual leaders.

Action Area 4) Development of services for mobile or migrant people and groups

Strategy 4.3 Further develop programs and services to be delivered by peers in migrant and multicultural organisations and HIV sector organisations

Measuring Achievements

Sharing Stories adopted a strong evidence-based approach. Epidemiology updates, research and community needs analysis formed the basis for program planning and development. An extensive literature review and focus groups were conducted to determine how best to address identified issues. Pre and post impact evaluation was conducted after implementation of each project activity. Process evaluation was done to ensure that interventions were being conducted as planned. Sharing Stories conducted performance management and monitoring to create sustainability.

An evaluation¹ of Sharing Stories was conducted in 2013 and showed increased knowledge, confidence in seeking STI testing, and positive attitudes towards carrying condoms. This evaluation found that theatre and drama-based sexual health strategies were effective with multicultural youth.

Lessons Learnt

For many multicultural youth, sexual health is considered a shameful and taboo topic. Interactive and creative strategies are an effective way of delivering sexual health education. The use of an arts-based data collection in conjunction with a survey tool was effective at measuring changes in skills and knowledge.
