




THE ROADSHOW

- Coincided with ATSI HIV Awareness Week

47 women and 16 men, and 13 young women attended community sessions





2 very lively and interactive workshops were conducted with both 32 men and 6 women within Derby Regional Prison

DERBY

A workshop was conducted within Derby Aboriginal health service and 2 workshops conducted with hospital HCW's



Fitzroy Crossing included two community sessions, a HCWs session and a school talk

The community sessions were broken up into 'women's business' and 'men's business' for cultural appropriateness

FITZROY CROSSING

An interview about ATS#HAW and the Kimberley BBV tour was also recorded at Wangki Radio



The last stop on the tour was Halls Creek. At the district hospital an information session was conducted with 12 HCWs. We also conducted training with community HCW and council staff at the Shire of Halls creek, and 2 workshops were conducted within Halls Creek High School

HALLS CREEK

During the eight days, around **25** educational initiatives were undertaken. This directly exposed **300** people to education around BBV's, and hopefully indirectly exposed many more

- 94% found the event very useful to extremely useful
- 91% believed their knowledge had increase significantly
- 83% felt an increase in confidence working with individuals with a BBV
- 74% thought the event had increased their level of competence

EVALUATIONS
