Project Aims

To increase the uptake of STI and BBV testing and increase treatment rates for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander youth living in remote and very remote areas of South Australia, Western Australia, Northern Territory and Queensland.

Project Sub-aims

- 1. Investigate the effectiveness of a youth peer education model with remote Aboriginal young people aged 16-29 years in increasing awareness, knowledge and prevention of STIs and BBVs
- 2. Improved clinical outcomes related to testing of STI/BBV among Aboriginal young people living in remote and very remote communities.

The sexual health professional development needs of remote primary healthcare clinicians

Objective

To identify and prioritise professional development resource needs for remote clinicians to increase awareness and build confidence to talk about sexual health and to offer STI & BBV testing to young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.



Methods

Mixed methods with three stages

- 20 question online survey
- Focus Group Consultations
- Pulling together existing resources identified through the focus groups and survey into an audit tool





Respondents



Female remote area nurses – 60% Aboriginal Torres Strait Islander HW/HP- 21% Non-Indigenous – 70% Practised for longer than 6 years





Stage 2

24 participants
Similar to above demographics
(female, +6 years, mainly nurses)
More identified as Indigenous - 54%


