
1 Human capital, reduce fertility, health education, job skills

Education — the key to breaking cycles of poverty (UNICEF)

- The longer a girl stays in school, the greater the probability that she will stay out of sex work
- School attendance builds social networks and limits the hours children can work
- While studying, children are not leaving their villages for sex employment in cities.
- Better educated girls and boys are much less likely to fall for the promises made by brokers
